#### **Y8 GIRLS' ENGINEERING TEAM WIN THE AWE COMPETITION**

At the beginning of March a team of students ventured out to compete in the annual AWE Y8 Girls' Engineering Competition. They were pitted against school teams from Basingstoke and Berkshire. Working as a team but in isolation from any teachers or support, the girls had to design and build a series of devices, in a very limited amount of time. Each device was then tested for the whole audience.

The first challenge was to make a tower that was not only tall but also stable. The test had an ever increasing amount of weight placed upon the tower. While our tower was not the tallest, it was, by far, the most stable and managed to hold the full set of weights. No other team managed anything close.

The second challenge had the team making a series of inclined ramps that allowed a ball to roll slowly downwards. Our team created a magnificent device in only 25 minutes (see photograph). It worked perfectly but others were better.

The final challenge had the teams all making deceleration systems. Raw eggs were dropped from ever increasing heights and the devices had to catch the eggs - unbroken. In the first drop, our team's device caught the egg perfectly, only to then see it bounce out and smash into a gooey mess. A slight change in the cushioning system and the removal of the inflated, bouncy rubber glove, and the device worked perfectly from then on. The all-important positioning of the device was ably handled by Katelyn, with the rest of the team enthusiastically shouting 'advice' from the stands.

In the end, when all the prizes were handed out, Robert May's were on top of the podium, holding a very large cheque for the D&T department, £25 Amazon vouchers and a huge Easter egg for each member of the team. Well done to all.

#### F1 IN SCHOOLS NATIONAL FINALS AT THE NEC 13-15 MARCH 2014

#### **Qualifying**

Way back in February, Robert May's School arrived at the F1 in Schools SE England Regional Championships, held at Chelsea FC, near London. Our three teams all had the intention of winning silverware and hopefully qualifying for the National Finals. Over the past twelve years the SE England region has produced more national champion teams than all the other regions put together - no pressure then. By half four in the afternoon, RMS had five pieces of silver and all three teams were on their way to the finals in Birmingham. No school has ever sent three teams to the finals. This is their story - so far.

Eighteen students one minibus and an overburdened transit van delivered the three teams to their Birmingham hotel the night before the competition. The planning of the trip was tight - the teams had to immediately chuck their bags in their rooms and climb back into the vans - off to Wagamama's. This meal was a relaxing moment and down-time for the teams before the big days ahead. A big thanks goes to Nila Pillai for providing a magnificent birthday cake for Mr. Cain's 50th. A great and much appreciated surprise for all, especially Mr. Cain as his birthday was in December.

#### The F1 in Schools National Final - Bloodhound Class

The two F1 Bloodhound teams have been working non-stop on the F1 challenge for over six months. This work has come on top of their normal studies and has involved not only car design, CAD and manufacture, but also marketing, raising sponsorship and liaising with local businesses - all of whom have generously supported or teams through these trying months.

On the first day of competition, Team Venom and Ignition, our two Bloodhound teams, were taken through a series of interviews and verbal presentations. There were seventeen judges for this competition and twenty teams competing. Everything the teams have produced and learnt was The engineering interviews alone lasted over thirty minutes and that was the so called "easy" one. However, without a doubt, the most nerve-wracking event of the day was the car racing. The cars that these two teams produced had been designed, tested, analysed and developed. Countless hours of labour had gone into the manufacture and the results were fantastic. By the end of the racing, all twenty cars had raced down the track, accelerating to 80mph in less than 0.3 second. The better cars were covering the measured 20m in less than 0.7 second. Aerodynamics played a massive part of this racing and any car that was not properly designed or accurately manufactured either shot off the track or smashed into tiny fragments at the end of the track - much appreciated by the huge crowds but not the poor students who had put so much effort into making them. In the end, Robert May's cars stood in positions one and two. However, the competition had a few more twists and turns before the prizes were awarded. Ignition's car faced a late critical rule failure and subsequent appeal. In the appeal, against a panel of Jaguar/Land Rover engineers and the chief judge, the team argued their case valiantly and honourably. They would not find out their fate until the awards ceremony.

Twenty teams and only a handful of trophies. Scant reward for six months' toil. Hundreds of schools across the UK started this year's challenge and only the top twenty had made it through to the National Finals. I have watched both teams develop and grow - they have learned so much, so fast. Not only have they learned about aerodynamics and accurate manufacturing but also marketing, business planning, working with sponsors and - most importantly - working together as a team

Team Venom came in third and Ignition came 2nd - in the country. Fantastic!

## The F1 in Schools National Final - F1 Class

An evening's entertainment and celebrations (compliments of Venom and Ignition) could not, and did not, get in the way of Colossus F1's final preparations. This team had been together and working on their challenge for well over a year. Competing in the senior, 11-19 year-old class, our team had only one aim - qualification for the World Finals, being held in Abu Dhabi later this year. Two years ago, Robert May's sent Team Rush to the World championships and they came in an incredible third place. Colossus, standing on the shoulders of these giants were pitching for the World title.

Their car, featuring venturi tunnels, a vented pressure recovery system, 3d printed chassis and wheels accurate to 0.01mm, had multi-tiered front and rear aerofoils that bent, twisted and channelled air under, over and around the body. The rear of the car was even coated in a fine aluminium oxide grit to bring the coanda effect into play (golf ball technology). And if you are still keeping up...the team then added a plug-in air cushion over the rear aerofoil and trigger system, giving the car a little turbo boost and saving over .02 of a second.

For the big teams, the event was spread over two days and had a few extra engineering and scrutineering interviews. On the first day of competition, our team had the dreaded formal, verbal presentation. Only ten minutes long, followed by a searching Q&A session. This is, without a doubt, the most feared part of the competition. Colossus F1 scored 175/180, the top score and their first piece of silverware.

The second day was far more emotional and stressful. The team's car was out first on the track and the air temperature was down. Even with rock solid trigger starts, provided by the honed and perfectly coiffed Charlie Flynn, the car came in a lowly tenth place (of 30). The team were in pieces. The team had for over a year worked on this car. The design went through more

than twenty modifications. It was tested in wind tunnels, on the track and through accurate computation fluid dynamic simulations (that's computer testing to the aerodynamically challenged). Much of the year had been spent working with sponsors and supporters such as Autodesk and Chichester University. These wonderfully supportive people had put their trust and time into the team and slow car times were not in the team's remit or strategy.

A few hours later - the knockout rounds. The air had warmed up and all thirty cars were on the track together. The reaction training by Chichester University, this time, paid off and Colossus picked up their second piece of silverware. The team were back on top with the fastest car in town.

Disaster comes when you are not expecting it. Waiting back at their pit area was the chief judge, tournament organiser and chief scrutineer. Colossus F1's car had been measured and checked against the hundred or so regulations and it had broken one of them. The car was too low to the ground by 0.4mm. This may not seem much, the equivalent to the thickness four sheets of paper, nor is any time advantage gained. However, the rule had been broken. The next few hours were a blur as judges and supporters all tried to come up with valid reasons for an appeal or work-around but there were none.

At the end of the two days, the awards ceremony went ahead and despite Colossus having amassed the most points, they were only allowed to climb onto the runners-up position on the podium. Together with their knock-out trophy and Verbal Presentation trophy, they were magnificent throughout, and a real credit to Robert May's School and the F1 in Schools challenge.

In placing second and by scoring more points than any other team, Colossus F1 have also collected one more title. They are the new England champions. they will therefore travel to Abu Dhabi in November to represent England in the F1 in Schools World Championships.

Not the end.

## **MAGISTRATES MOCK COURT TRIAL**

Since the start of January 16 students from years 8 and 9 have stayed after school every Thursday and, along with the help of Mrs Wingfield have been rehearsing, learning inside and out a court case that we would then have to fight for and against. This was such a hard task and in such little time but we also had the help of a legal adviser, Jane who came every Thursday and helped us prepare for the competition. She watched us rehearse and gave every single person advice on how to improve. Whether you were a lawyer or a witness Jane could help to make your performance even better and more convincing because we all took on roles and jobs we wouldn't normally have.

To get a better idea of what the court was like because most of us had never been in a court (let alone know how they work) we went to Aldershot Magistrates court and watched a court case going on. On our way in we were searched by security and then shown upstairs to a waiting room where we waited until a case was about to start. We then entered the court to watch the case. After lunch we had the opportunity to practice our court case in a real court which was amazing because it felt like it was the real competition. I think everyone benefited from this experience and we all knew a bit more about how a court trial works ready for the competition.

The roles differ widely: there are the 4 lawyers (2 prosecution and 2 defence). Prosecution have to prove the defendant is quilty but defence don't have to prove they are innocent. They both cross -examine and examine-in-chief the witnesses. There are 4 witnesses - again 2 prosecution and 1 defence and the defendant. The prosecution and the defence just state the facts and say what they saw or know whereas the defendant is the one being charged and they must convince the Magistrates they were innocent. There are 3 Magistrates and they are unbiased and they sit through the prosecution and the defence and it is their job to decide whether the defendant is quilty. There is one legal adviser and it is their job to give the magistrates id slips of the names of the defence and prosecution lawyers. After the prosecution and defence case the legal adviser reads a summary of the law informing the magistrates on what to take into consideration when deciding their verdicts. There is 1 usher who swears the witnesses into the court and asks everyone to stand when the magistrates come in. There are 2 court reporters and they sit through the prosecution and the defence and write down the events that took place, they will be later be entered into individual competition. There is 1 court artist and their job is similar to the court reporter's except they need to create a piece of art showing what is taking place and they again will be entered into a separate competition. There are 2 reserves and they are as much part as the team as the lawyers or magistrates; they came to every rehearsal and the competition in case someone couldn't make it and so they could stand in for them.

The competition was on Saturday 1st March in Basingstoke Magistrates Court. This was the locals with six teams competing, but there would be only one winner and no runners-up so we had to try really hard. The winners would then go through to the regionals. There are different locals going on throughout the country so there are many more schools than six and the winner of each local went through to the regionals.

We defended first so our defence lawyers, the defence witnesses, our three magistrates and the usher went in the court and fought the case. Every person is marked out of ten and the verdict of the case has no effect on your marks however it does look good if you win but it won't matter. In the first case the verdict was not guilty due to lack of evidence which means we won that trial however it didn't make a difference to the points. We then prosecuted second so that meant the two prosecution lawyers, the two prosecution witnesses, our three magistrates and the legal adviser went and fought the case. Unfortunately the verdict was once again not guilty meaning we didn't win the trial but that didn't matter.

After every school had defended and prosecuted everyone was called into a court for the certificates to be given out and the winner announced. Everyone who participated got a certificate and after they were given out they announced the winner. I am extremely happy to say Robert May's School won the local Magistrates Mock Court Trial Competition so everyone went to get their picture taken with the trophy. This is the 5th time we have won the trophy. We are the only school to be named on the trophy more than once which is a massive achievement. We now go on to the regional finals which will be held in Southampton on 17th May.



We will now have a new court case to fight as well as the old one, and we might prosecute or defend so we need to know both. We will be staying after school and rehearsing ready for the regionals.

#### **BERLIN EXCHANGE 2014**

## **Visit to Odiham**

On Tuesday 17 March our German visitors arrived from Berlin and were greeted by Robert May's students waving welcome banners in the sunshine. They had a wonderful week visiting Portsmouth, Windsor and London and they had a joint trip with their partners to Thorpe Park.

The highlight of the trip was an anniversary celebration to mark 10 years of successful exchanges with our partner school, Werner-von-Siemens. The event was funded by a grant awarded by the UK German Connection in recognition of the work which our school has done to encourage and promote Anglo-German links.

A very special cake was created by Gareth Jones of Odiham Cake Company and we were serenaded by musicians and singers, organised by Mrs Hills. The evening was attended by school governors, German exchange students and their Robert May's host families, pupils from our feeder primary schools as well as past exchange students who are now at 6<sup>th</sup> form college. Prior to the celebration, a special online group was set up which linked up all previous exchange students and shared comments and photos from the last 10 years. One college student wrote that this had motivated her to get back in touch with her former partner and start chatting again in German.



As a result of the exchange, many students went on to do work experience placements in the Kindergarten and primary school attached to our partner secondary school and they have since gone on to study German to A level and even to degree level. The results of a survey completed by former students clearly showed that the exchanges had had a great impact on them and some described the experiences as life-changing. Here are some of the comments from past students.

"The exchange gave me confidence to try new things in my life. Ever since my first exchange in 2006 I have felt comfortable going to new cultures and trying things I might not have done before. It has also given me some life-long friends that I am still very close to today."

"It was definitely one of the highlights of my time at Robert Mays and it's made me want to go back in the near future to experience Berlin....as an adult!"

"I loved Berlin and will definitely go back some time. It equipped me brilliantly for GCSE and made me much better at meeting new people etc. Also the work experience is awe-some, I'd highly recommend it! I have made friends which I would probably never have met and it made me more determined to carry on studying German."

"The exchange family were very welcoming and by the time I came home I was beginning to "think" in German as well as speaking it. I enjoyed working in the school, and I gained confidence as I found myself surrounded by attentive German children in the Kindergarten. I came home in love with Berlin and keen to do A level German (having initially been un-keen even to do the GCSE). Although primarily a science person I have even considered spending time in Germany as part of a degree course."

"The fact that the children spoke more slowly than other Germans meant that I understood almost everything they said and I was quite proud of myself. All in all I had an amazing time and if I had the chance I would definitely go back and do it again; I enjoyed it so much."

"The Berlin Exchange is one of the main reasons, if not the main reason, for me choosing the university course I did and for coming back to Berlin to study maths while speaking German 95% of the time with a fluency that surprises even myself - something I couldn't have imagined all those 6 years ago."






# CROSS COUNTRY






